# Rule: Pronunciation of /h/ after consonants

- Let him go.
- I can send her a message.
- In his book <u>Oliver Twist</u>, Dickens has talked about poverty.

# Rule: Assimilation

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/d/ becomes /g/ if the following word starts with /g/ or /k/
/d/ or /t/ become /b/ if the following word starts with /b/
/d/ or /t/ become /p/ if the following word starts with /p/
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Good girl. She's a good girl. (goog girl)
Good boy. He's a good boy. (goob boy)
White paper. I only use white paper. (whipe paper)
Speed boat. I've never been in speed boat. (speeb boat)
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# Rule: Sounds change (assimilation)

- Because of the place in the mouth where certain sounds are made, sometimes the sound at the end of the first word changes to a completely different sound.
- Can go. We can go now. (kæŋ gəʊ)
  Can buy. We can buy it. (cam buy)
  Green Park. I walked through Green Park. (greem park)
  - On Monday. He arrives on Monday. (om Monday)

# Rule: Sounds change (assimilation)

- There is another common form of assimilation when both the last sound of the first word and the first sound of the following word change to a third sound.
- Would you. Would you like some tea?
   Did you. Did you see it?

#### Rule: Elision (Cont.)

d or t + ð
Drop d or t

Should they come early?

Let them go.

At the *end* of verbs

Talk about them.

Note: Ali and the other boys are absent today.

#### Rule: Elision

Is there any life on Mars?

#### Rule 7: Semi-twinning

- When a word ends with the sound /t/ and the following word starts with /d/, drop the /t/.
- Ex. What do you do?
- My greatest day at work
- When a word ends with the sound /d/ and the following word starts with /t/, drop the /d/.
- Ex. Hard times
- He should take my warning seriously.

# Rule 8: Pronunciation of "ed"

# Pronunciation of ED



The pronunciation of words ending in ED depends on the final consonant (sound). There are three ways to pronounce ED:

# /id/

T wanted D needed
