- In his book <u>Oliver Twist</u>, Dickens has talked about poverty.

# Rule: Sounds change (assimilation)

Would you. Would you like some tea?
Did you. Did you see it?

## Omission of a vowel/syllable

Chocolate

cho co late

choc lat

Camera

ca me ra

cam ra

Restaurant

res tau rant

rest rant

- Every
- Victory

## **Rule: Elision (Cont.)**

Should they come early?

Let them go.

At the *end* of verbs

Talk about them.

Is there any life on Mars?

## **Rule: Semi-twinning**

- When a word ends with the sound /t/ and the following word starts with /d/, drop the /t/.
- Ex. What do you do?
- My greatest day at work
- When a word ends with the sound /d/ and the following word starts with /t/, drop the /d/.
- Ex. Hard times
- He should take my warning seriously.
